# **Topics**

## 1. Frederick Douglass

Preamble:

Frederick Douglass was an iconic master of oratory, making him one of the greatest orators of all time. His brilliance in the elocution of his speeches motivated action, change, and deliverance. Topic:

Frederick Douglass lived from 1818-1895. What do you believe were the compelling forces that enabled him to make an impact on the people of his day that motivated revolutionary change in this country's history?

## 2. Video Games and Black Youth

Preamble:

The topic of video games is controversial. While they can be fun and a means to memory boosting, they can also have detrimental effects.

Topic:

The black community should weigh the effects of video games on black youth and the impact on their growth and development.

## 3. Animal Testing

Preamble:

Animal testing has produced the development of many life-saving medicines and consumer products. However, there are mixed arguments on the use of animal testing to accomplish this objective. Topic:

Should animals be used to test for new innovative medicines and safe consumer products?

### 4. Social Networking

Preamble:

Today, we live in a world where social networking has changed the way we think, communicate, exercise business undertakings, get our news, and more; not to mention the issue of privacy.

Topic:

What is the impact of social networking in our daily lives coupled with the advantages, disadvantages, and privacy concerns?

### 5. Genetically Engineered Food

Preamble:

Genetically engineered foods have been approved by our nation's U.S. Food and Drug Administration; however, there are real concerns about the safety of eating them.

Topic:

From your perspective, state why consumers should have the right to know if the food they are buying, and eating is genetically engineered.

## 6. <u>Robotics</u>

Preamble:

Robotics technology encompasses the design, construction, operation, and use of robots and computer systems. The ultimate purpose of these technologies is to substitute for humans and replicate human actions. Topic:

In your view, why is there a compelling need for Robotics in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century, especially, in situations that enhance medicine and relieve situations that would be dangerous to humans?

# 7. Saving the Planet

Preamble:

Earth Day is celebrated every April in more than 193 countries. It is a day held to focus on and promote environmental awareness that emphatically calls for the protection of our planet.

Topic:

You have been given the power and authority to save our planet, what policies, measures and so on, will you implement to protect Earth?

# 8. Veteran Care

Preamble:

The Purple Heart is the highest military award bestowed upon a member of the United States Armed Forces. It is the most respected medal in the military and awarded to a recipient who has died, was killed, or was wounded, while serving. Believe it or not, some Purple Heart recipients that were wounded and have returned home from battle, <u>may not receive full benefits</u>.

Topic:

Do you believe this is an issue to be remedied? Elaborate.

# 9. AI (Artificial Intelligence)

Preamble:

AI is another representation of progress, and it is here to stay just like the introduction of the internet; however, there are benefits and dangers.

Topic:

Can we prepare for this technology to protect humanity? Elaborate.

# 10. STEM and Minorities

Preamble:

STEM Education is the interdisciplinary concentration of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. An ever alarming and disheartening fact in America today, except for the Asian male demographic, is the underrepresentation of blacks and other minorities in STEM.

Topic:

Can this truth be corrected? What does the data suggest and what would you propose to remedy this situation?

## <u>Tips to Help</u>

### Tips for Writing Speech and Getting Ready for Competition

- 1. Memorize your speech
- 2. State your topic at the beginning of speech
- 3. Prepare a captivating opening statement
- 4. Speech cannot exceed 5 minutes, stay within the rules
- 5. Make eye contact with audience
- 6. Use facial expressions, hand gestures, body language, and humor if relevant
- 7. Practice the execution of speech and speak clearly
- 8. Act naturally
- 9. Be sensitive to your audience
- 10. Restate the theme at end with an equally appealing conclusion

### <u>Attire</u>

- 1. Look your best and dress for success!
- 2. Business attire is always a good choice.
- 3. Be sure to wear clothing that is comfortable.
